## INSTRUCTIONS TO FILE OBJECTIONS, PRAECIPES FOR TRANSCRIPTS, AND MOTIONS TO SET ASIDE

Please read the following information carefully regarding how to file an objection, praecipe for transcript and/or motion to set aside. These instructions do <u>NOT</u> apply if you need to file an appeal with the Second District Court of Appeals. Note that court personnel cannot give legal advice or tell you what specifics to include beyond these instructions.
